ASU Art Museum. Tempe, AZ

Project: Reporting to the Senior Curator, the ArtTable Curatorial Fellow will be exposed to aspects of curatorial operations, including exhibition planning, installation, research, and best practices in collection stewardship. Under the guidance of the Museum's Senior Curator, the Curatorial Fellow will directly work on two specific exhibitions, Desert Modern and Notes on Motherhood, while also having the opportunity to shadow the installation of two new exhibitions: an installation by Mariana Castillo Deball and a group exhibition of Chicano prints. The 8-week position is a unique opportunity for a fellow to see exhibition development at various stages, from early research to later-stage development of didactic materials to installation. The Fellow will also be exposed to working with multiple departments in the Museum, seeing how each department is an integral part of exhibition planning from curatorial to education, business office to conservation.

The Curatorial Fellow will assist with exhibition research, planning, and development for a two-person exhibition on artists and architects Benny Gonzales and Dennis Numkena (Hopi Pueblo), titled Desert Modern, opening in March 2025. Desert Modern seeks to uncover the previously untold history of modern architecture in Arizona. Both of these architects embraced a design approach that responded to local cultures, informed by their own Indigenous and Mexican American perspectives while retaining the distinctive characteristics of modernism. The Fellow will be responsible for artist research and the development of bibliographies to be used by the Museum's co-creation and learning department. In addition, the Fellow will work with the Senior Curator for early-stage checklist development by creating chips to think through groupings.

The Fellow will also assist with collections research and didactic writing for a group exhibition on motherhood, organized by Curator Brittany Corrales, opening in September 2024. Notes on Motherhood looks at the developmental stage of "matrescence" while complicating the overly romanticized, limited depictions of motherhood in the art historical canon and material culture. The exhibition and accompanying public programs will explore the nuances of invisible and

hidden labor and the intersections of race, economic status, and gender identity in motherhood. Focusing on care and nurturing rituals, Notes on Motherhood will explore tenderness, intimacy, kinship, community, wholeness, mental and physical health and well-being, and bodily autonomy. Rejecting the concept of motherhood as a monolith, the exhibition will also provide space for conversations around socially taboo feelings such as maternal grief, rage, and resentment and finding joy after birth trauma. The Fellow will work with the Curator, overseeing exhibition checklists, writing exhibition didactics, attending bi-weekly cross-departmental meetings, and learning about the curatorial process as it leads to installation.

Bachelor's degree in Fine Arts, Art History, or related field required; Master's degree in Fine Arts, Art History or related field preferred. Interest in and expertise in Contemporary Latinx and/or Indigenous art history. Strong research skills as it pertains to exhibition development. Evidence of effective oral and written communication skills. Ability to speak and write articulately on behalf of this Museum, its mission, collection, and relevance today and in the future. Ability to work collaboratively with the Museum's curatorial team and within the larger context of a contemporary art museum and university. Ability to work effectively in stressful situations involving changing priorities and tight timelines.

Black Cube Nomadic Art Museum. Denver, CO

Project: Founded in 2015, Black Cube is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit visual arts organization, headquartered in Colorado that produces site-specific contemporary art in the public realm. As a nomadic art museum, Black Cube's mission is to realize artists' ambitious ideas and inspire people to discover and appreciate contemporary art beyond traditional white museum and gallery walls. Our programs take place at unique locations throughout the Colorado region and beyond. Unlike stationary museums defined by permanent architecture, we produce site-specific artworks that relate to contexts, connecting audiences with communities, and aspiring to support the integration of art into everyday society. Each project undertaken relates explicitly to its site requiring in-depth research, community input, and meaningful partnerships. Since our

inception, we have been W.A.G.E. certified, reinforcing our commitment to ethical labor relations with artists. By creating a critical space for artists to experiment in unconventional contexts, our programs offer artists an opportunity to realize profound ideas that reach new and diverse audiences. These artworks provide timely, contextual reflections and motivate conversations on the rapidly changing world around us. We believe that increased interactions with art create healthier societies because such experiences encourage openness, curiosity, and tolerance.

Beginning May through September 2024, Black Cube is partnering with the Biennial of the Americas (BOTA) to open a temporary, outdoor commission for the Plaza of the Americas located in downtown Denver. Marking the third consecutive year of collaboration, Black Cube holds the role of Artistic Director. In this collaborative initiative, Black Cube, known for our innovative approach to curation, will take on the role of selecting an artist from the Americas, providing comprehensive support to produce the artwork, and overseeing all communications surrounding the artwork. Complementing this effort, the Biennial of the Americas (BOTA) will be hosting the opening event, amplifying the reach and impact of the artwork. BOTA will also extend its support through outreach activities, furthering its mission to foster connections and inspire change across the diverse communities of the Americas.

To bolster this temporary art commission, we are seeking an ArtTable Fellow to help build out community engagement programs and activations during the summer months to encourage community participation. Examples of these programs may include workshops in the plaza, writing exercises that reflect on the artwork, developing art kits for children who are inspired by the artwork, initiating partnerships with local organizations for film screenings or performances, and more. Mainly, the ArtTable Fellow will be responsible for researching, supporting, and developing community programs, and community outreach that are reflective of Denver's diverse communities, with a focus on broad accessibility and involving underrepresented voices. These dynamic programs will be developed alongside Black Cube and BOTA staff to ensure our collective commitment to promoting creativity, nurturing community engagement, and underscoring the transformative power of art in the public realm. We are enthusiastic about the meaningful impact this collaborative endeavor will have on our cultural landscape, and we look forward to the profound resonance it will create within the communities we serve, both locally and across the Americas.

Black Cube is seeking an ArtTable Fellow to join its team, in collaboration with BOTA, to assist with the research and development of community engagement programs in conjunction with a site-specific, temporary, outdoor artwork commission in Denver's Plaza of the Americas opening in May 2024. As the Artistic Director, Black Cube has selected an innovative project by Tulsa-based artist, Rachel Hayes, which features a large-scale, suspended, textile work that responds to the surrounding architecture and environment. Through colorful, patterned textiles, this commission will create a vibrant atmosphere, inspiring curiosity, as well as shady spaces for gathering during the hot summer months. Each year, this partnership highlights a commissioned artwork by an artist from the Americas, and 2024 will mark the first

commissioned artwork for the plaza by a single woman artist based in the United States. Last year, we featured a collaborative installation by Canadian artists, Julia Jamrozik and Coryn Kempster, and in 2022 we highlighted a sculptural intervention by Mexican artist Gabriel Rico.

The Plaza of the Americas is a high-profile area located in the heart of downtown Denver, near popular restaurants, shops, and entertainment. The plaza is a publicly accessible space adjacent to the 16th St Mall and a key pedestrian connection between the nearby Union Station train terminal. RTD's Free MallRide buses operate along the 16th St Mall and plaza 7 days a week. The Triangle Building is another feature of the plaza, which houses the Biennial of the Americas' offices. The plaza holds a unique historical significance, as it was once a part of the railroad infrastructure that played a crucial role in the region's development. Today, the plaza stands as a testament to this rich history. This fusion of historical significance and contemporary urban design makes the plaza a compelling canvas for the commissioned artwork, symbolizing the convergence of the region's past, present, and future.

The ArtTable Fellow will have an opportunity to deeply learn about this site and the surrounding Denver communities. Additionally, they will gain first-hand experience in the day-to-day operations of an experimental, nonprofit, visual arts organization, as well as an understanding of the tasks associated with presenting artwork in the public realm. This position is focused on the research, development, and execution of community engagement programs and activities that conceptually relate to artist Rachel Haye's artwork and meaningfully resonate with diverse communities. The ArtTable Fellow will be expected to develop programming that is accessible and inclusive to all audiences and varied demographics. As a part of Black Cube's mission, all programs will be free and open to the public.

Required Skills/Qualifications:

Ideal candidates will have an interest in the curation, production, and artwork development aspects of Black Cube's site-specific art commissions, as well as an interest in learning about the day-to-day operations of an experimental nonprofit art organization. Given our organization's small staff, the ArtTable Fellow will have an opportunity to work closely with Black Cube's team and will play an integral role in fostering increased access to contemporary art through intentional community outreach.

remotely and anticipate working with the ArtTable Fellow both on-site and remotely.

The Bronx Museum of the Arts. Bronx, NY

Project: The Bronx Museum of the Arts is seeking a Collections Management Fellow. This Fellowship provides an emerging professional with in-depth training and invaluable experience in collection management in the Museum's Curatorial Department. The Fellow would have the opportunity to work with curatorial staff on research, documentation, care, presentation, and accessibility of the permanent collection of contemporary art.

The Bronx Museum's Permanent Collection was established in 1986, and focused on works on paper by artists of African, Asian and Latin American ancestry to "reflect the borough's dynamic communities." Today, the collection comprises over 2,000 works of art in all media by artists of African, Asian, and Latin American ancestry, and artists who live(d) and/or work(ed) in the Bronx and for whom the Bronx has been critical to their artistic practice and development. Artists in the Permanent Collection include Alvin Baltrop, Romare Bearden, Sanford Biggers, Tania Bruguera, Willie Cole, Abigail DeVille, Leonardo Drew, Luis Jiménez, Nikki S. Lee, Ana Mendieta, Pepón Osorio, Adrian Piper, Tim Rollins & K.O.S., Lorna Simpson, Rufino Tamayo, Tseng Kwong Chi, Kara Walker, Carrie Mae Weems, and Martin Wong, among others.

The Bronx Museum is currently undertaking a complete and detailed audit and digitization of its collection to publish it online. During this process, the Fellow will undergo training and be involved in the following:

Process of handling and condition reporting artworks.

Provenance research and records management for collection objects.

Collection Database management, including updating object information in the Museum's digital database.

Coordinating photography and metadata organization for collection digitization.

The Fellow will have hands-on experience in each of these areas during their appointment. The Fellow will be supervised and mentored by The Bronx Museum's Director of Curatorial Programs

Eileen Jeng Lynch, and will be working closely and collaboratively with the Museum's Registrar and Exhibitions Manager Ashlye Valines, former curators, and guest experts. The Fellow will play an intricate role in a small team of a mid-size nonprofit. The Fellow participates in department meetings and will also present their work and findings to the entire curatorial team, program

directors, and Museum leadership.

As of Fall 2023, The Bronx Museum has embarked on its large-scale renovation project of its South Wing, in which two-thirds of the Museum is closed, and the permanent collection has been moved to an off-site fine art storage facility. With the reopening of the renovated South Wing in 2026, there would also be an opportunity for the Fellow to propose a future exhibition of the collection along with writing descriptions/labels for the artworks.

Brooklyn Museum. Brooklyn, NY

Project: The ArtTable Fellow will assist the Senior and Assistant Curators of Decorative Arts and Design with three related cross-collection projects being developed in honor of the Brooklyn Museum's 200th anniversary. Beginning in Fall 2024, the Museum will celebrate its 200th

anniversary with several community festivities, gallery re-installations, and exhibitions. As part of the celebration, the Senior Curator of Decorative Arts and Design will be working on two projects. One will feature gifts made to the Museum in honor of the anniversary and the other will be about the history of the Museum and its collecting practices. The Assistant Curator is planning a show that explores creativity in Brooklyn and the way the borough has been shaped as an innovative, diverse, and provocative center of artistic production. All three exhibitions will open in February 2025.

Collaborating with the curators on all three installations, the Fellow will help provide research for labels, provenance, and new acquisitions, write tombstones and labels, contribute to digital marketing –especially social media–and public and educational program planning, and attend interpretation, design, and conservation meetings. Additional research may require visits to local libraries and archives. Through this process, the Fellow will participate in discussions with internal stakeholders and gain first-hand experience in the inner workings of a major art museum focused on issues of social justice, social impact, and community.

The Fellow will develop project management skills, improve their ability to do research and writing and cultivate interpersonal skills in a collaborative work environment.

Required Skills/Qualifications: Candidates must have strong collaborative and communication abilities. They should have experience researching primary and secondary sources and a sophisticated mode of expressing ideas in writing. A previous background in the decorative arts and design is not required, but a degree in Art History is preferred. Curiosity to learn new fields and skills is highly desired.

Carolee Schneemann Foundation. New Paltz, NY

Project: In the summer of 2024, the Carolee Schneemann Foundation (CSF) will work with Stanford University to publish significant archival material online, including six decades of the artist's diaries. This important material, which delves into the life and artistic collaborations of this pioneering feminist artist and has been closed to researchers until now, has been scanned by Stanford University and will be available via their library browser system and through the

foundation's website. The ArtTable Fellow will create a searchable system for the digitized material, linking entries to artworks, timelines, and individuals, and there is the potential to collaborate with Stanford on the creation of a handwriting recognition system (OCR) that will allow researchers to search the diaries and correspondence more easily. The fellow will have unparalleled access to Schneemann's writings, images, and library at the artist's home in New Paltz, New York, and will gain skills in archival research, digital preservation, and the activities of an artist-endowed foundation.

The fellow will also establish connections in the professional arts field by coordinating and producing content to present the archival material through outlets such as blogs, print magazines, and the CSF Instagram page. In addition to the research and organization of this exciting new material, the fellow will work at Schneemann's home on the artist's library, collaborating with Schneemann's galleries and ARS (Artist Rights Society) to ensure that the reference material at the house is complete.

Throughout the fellowship, independent research will be coupled with onsite archival study at the artist's historic house in upstate New York. Onsite research will be overseen by CSF's manager and archivist, and CSF's director will give editorial direction for written materials. The fellow will also work closely with the staff administering CSF's media presence while crafting promotional material. The fellow will complete this fellowship with tangible research and writing contributions on an artist whose significance in performance and visual art continues to grow, an expanded professional network both within and outside the Carolee Schneemann Foundation, and committed mentors and advocates for the remainder of their professional career.

Required Skills/Qualifications

The fellow should be inquisitive, detail-oriented, and well-organized. The fellow will be asked to think creatively about arranging and contextualizing the art and subjects discussed in diaries, personal correspondence, and essays. Because communication is a key component of the fellowship, the fellow should have strong writing, editing, and research skills, an ability to present art and theory to non-academic audiences, and an eagerness to share their findings with the general public, journalists, and scholars. An interest in art history, archives, and the presentation of digital content and audio to online audiences is important.

We propose that the fellow work onsite at Schneemann's home Tuesday – Thursday each week, and CSF will be able to support a travel allowance. Mondays will be for independent research and remote work. Ideally, the fellow is within driving distance of New Paltz and has access to a car, but we understand that this may not be feasible. Schneemann's home is located two hours north of

New York City and accessible by bus, so should the fellow reside in the NYC area, we could plan for two days on site and two days of remote work weekly, with a one-week-long intensive stay in the upstate area in mid-July.

Center for the Study of Political Graphics. Los Angeles, CA

Project: The Center for the Study of Political Graphics is a non-profit, educational, and research archive that collects, preserves, documents and exhibits posters, prints, and other political ephemera related to historical and contemporary movements for social change. Our mission is to advance the power of art to educate and inspire people to action. In 2022, CSPG began a multi-year initiative to digitize the poster collection of over 90,000 items. To date, 54% of the archive has been digitized.

Approximately 50% of the fellow's time will contribute to this major initiative. They will begin and complete the processing and digitization of approximately 60-100 posters on a topic of their choice. They will also assist CSPG's Archives Director and Project Archivist in the collection digitization project. The fellow's tasks will include sorting posters by topic, creating and editing catalog records, photography, resizing images, and attaching them to database records. This work requires attention to detail and offers the fellow practical experience with all major steps in a mass digitization project at a small collecting institution.

The fellow will be trained to catalog artwork on both an object and collection level within a museum-style collections management system. They will also be trained to photograph artwork and process images according to museum standards and in basic handling, storage, and preservation of paper materials.

In addition, the fellow will assist with preliminary research for "Subvertisements: Using Ads & Logos for Protest" (working title), an international poster exhibition to open in Spring 2025. Their duties related to this project will be to identify relevant posters in CSPG's collection and catalog and do preliminary research on them. Research will range from artists and graphic collectives to social movements and historical events. The fellow will also prepare a slideshow presentation for the curatorial committee.

The fellow will also work on finding relevant posters that are not in CSPG's current collection by identifying and contacting poster producing collectives and artists who might have posters to contribute. Other activities will include: contributing an entry for CSPG's "Poster of the Week" newsletter and professional development activities. Professional development activities are different for each person, but have typically included: informational interviews, building skillsets beyond immediate job responsibilities, and networking with CSPG's community of artists, educators, and museum workers who share a passion for political art.

This fellowship has a strong independent research component and is ideal for someone curious about collections management, curation, and/or image services. The fellowship will involve hands-on work with the collection, and the fellow's interests should include art history, social justice, and/or political art.

Required Skills/Qualifications: CSPG seeks a fellow who is passionate about working at the intersection of arts and social justice activism. CSPG is seeking a fellow studying post-1945 art history, visual culture, history, museum studies, and/or archival management.

The fellow will be working directly with CSPG's poster collection and must have demonstrated ability to follow basic collections care and/or handling policies in a GLAM setting. Visual literacy skills are also essential for working with posters at CSPG. These skills are: 1) ability to describe the pictorial and graphic elements of an image 2) ability to describe and identify relevant cultural and historical factors that will help in understanding an image's purposes, meanings, and message.

Candidates for this fellowship should have an awareness of or experience with collections management systems. Photography or digitization experience is a plus, but not required.

The position requires a self-motivated, detail-oriented, and organized individual, with strong oral and written communication skills.

The selected fellows will play a pivotal role in the planning and execution of the Historias festival, a city-wide Latinx festival of arts and history, and will also focus on content curation and development on our Bloomberg Connects app.

The primary objective of the fellowship will be to support the curatorial and project management aspects of the festival, with a specific focus on laying the groundwork for artistic commissions that celebrate the rich cultural heritage of the Latinx community. The fellows will be actively engaged in the following key responsibilities:

Content Curation: The fellow will be charged with creating digital content (videos, audio, images, copy material) as documentation of ongoing works and programs at The Clemente, and for new productions like interviews, and mini-docs. They will also be involved with producing printed materials (zines, brochures, posters) related to The Clemente's general programs.

Curatorial Framework Development: The fellow will collaborate with our curatorial team to develop a robust curatorial framework for the Historias festival. This framework will serve as the foundation for selecting and showcasing artistic commissions that reflect the diverse and unrealized narratives within the Latinx community.

Open Call Criteria and Guidelines: To ensure an inclusive and equitable selection process, the fellows will contribute to the development of open call criteria and guidelines. These criteria will be designed to attract a wide range of artists and projects that authentically represent the multifaceted aspects of Latinx arts and history.

Project Management Support: The fellows will actively participate in project management activities, assisting in the coordination and execution of selected commissions. This will include liaising with artists and organizations, overseeing timelines and benchmarks, assessing the needs of partners, and ensuring that the creative vision aligns with the overarching goals of the festival.

Community Engagement: Recognizing the importance of community involvement, the fellows will be tasked with fostering connections between artists and the local community. They will develop plans to conduct and ensure outreach initiatives, workshops, and events that encourage community participation and ensure that the festival resonates with its intended audience. Documentation and Evaluation: The fellows will play a key role in documenting the entire curatorial and project management process. This includes creating comprehensive records, evaluations, and reports that will contribute to the ongoing improvement of future festivals and initiatives.

Our project is designed to provide a rich and immersive learning experience for the ArtTable fellows, allowing them to actively contribute to the development and success of the Historias

festival. We are confident that their professional level and genuine interest in learning will make a meaningful impact on the festival's overall success and contribute to their growth within the field of arts and cultural management.

Required Skills/Qualifications: The success of the proposed work for the ArtTable Fellowship Program relies on individuals possessing a diverse set of skills and core competencies. We seek fellows who exhibit a combination of creativity, organizational prowess, cultural sensitivity, and a genuine passion for the arts. The desired skill set and core competencies for the proposed work include:

Curatorial Expertise: Fellows should have a foundational understanding of curatorial practices, with the ability to conceptualize and articulate curatorial frameworks. Knowledge of contemporary art, particularly within the Latinx context, is crucial for shaping a festival that is both innovative and culturally relevant.

Project Management Skills: Strong organizational and project management skills are essential for overseeing the logistics of the festival. Fellows should be adept at managing timelines, coordinating multiple tasks, and collaborating with various stakeholders to ensure the successful execution of artistic commissions.

Project: The Social and Public Art Resource Center (SPARC) is seeking an emerging arts professional who has recently graduated or is currently enrolled in a graduate/pre/post-doctoral program for the position of Public Art Research Fellow. This position will focus on organizing and curating research collected by The Great Wall of Los Angeles Institute as part of an 8-year public art initiative to extend The Great Wall of Los Angeles mural to one mile by 2028.

The Great Wall is a half-mile mural in the Los Angeles River that represents the untold histories of California's minority and indigenous communities. Painted between 1976 and 1983 by artists, community members, and 400+ youth, The Great Wall is recognized as one of the earliest examples of public practice and community muralism. The Great Wall of Los Angeles Institute is refining the original mural methodology to engage a new generation of artists and youth in the production of another half-mile of mural representing the histories of six decades (1960s-2020). The Great Wall Institute is supporting research efforts for the design of the mural extension Mural with information on the social and environmental histories of the site and the histories to be represented within the mural. The Public Art Research Fellow will work with the Institute's research team and director to organize content in SPARC's Scalar database to be made available to public audiences online, identify research gaps, and assist with related and future gallery exhibitions.

The Public Art Research Fellow will work across departments including at SPARC Digital Mural Lab, the artistic and digital production team at SPARC, the research team, and the Durón Gallery to assist in the curation of exhibition and public programming. The Public Art Research Fellow will gain professional experience in a community-based non-profit visual arts organization and unique insights into community engagement and muralism. The Great Wall Institute is poised to be one of the largest public art initiatives in Los Angeles since the 1970s and the Fellow's work will support making the research collected accessible to the public. Project: The fellowship project proposed by The Easton Foundation centers around assessing, cleaning, preserving, and cataloging books from Louise Bourgeois's Erasmus Books and Prints, a bookstore the artist operated between 1956 and1959 and a lesser-known aspect of her biography. In conjunction with this archival processing work, the fellow will also be asked to research Erasmus on-site and in other archives in New York.

Supplemental to this primary project will be two smaller projects that can be explored further according to the fellow's interest: 1.) the opportunity to review/edit transcriptions and follow archival guidelines and standards to describe selected audio diaries created by Bourgeois in the 1960s and 1970s; 2.) research, plan, and possibly begin to implement an inventory of objects in Bourgeois's preserved home and off-site storage.

Through this work, the fellow will gain experience processing, describing, and arranging several different formats of archival materials (books, audiovisual recordings, and objects) and will participate in planning meetings regarding the direction of the projects. They will also be invited to learn about and engage with Bourgeois's life and artwork by assisting with tours of her home. Additionally, the fellow will be invited to join planned visits to other artist's archives, preserved homes, or similar institutions.

All three components of the fellowship will fill gaps in the Foundation's archive – there are no photographs or significant research on Erasmus Books; the audio diaries are underexplored documents of Bourgeois's life in the 5 years before her husband's death; and the objects inventory is a penultimate project in the conservation of her home. Thus, the proposed fellowship will greatly contribute to the Foundation's mission to preserve Bourgeois's archive and facilitate research into her life and work. The fellow will be expected to document and report on the project for the benefit of their professional development and the continuation of the Foundation's archival work.

New York Studio School. New York, NY

Project: The New York Studio School (NYSS) will present an exhibition exploring the life and work of modern artist Beauford Delaney in Fall 2025. This exhibition, tentatively titled Dialogues in Color: A Tribute to Beauford Delaney, will examine the often-overlooked exchange between the Harlem Renaissance and the downtown arts scene, therefore demonstrating the wealth of intellectual cross-pollination across media, race, and class in New York City during the first half of the twentieth century. The show will be organized by Dr. Kara Carmack, NYSS's Assistant Director of Exhibitions and Public Programs, in collaboration with the scholar and poet Dr. Arlene Keizer, Professor and former Chairperson of Humanities and Media Studies at Pratt Institute.

Dialogues in Color will honor Delaney's interconnected history with the creative community he befriended in New York; with the site of NYSS's building, the original home of the Whitney Museum of American Art; and with contemporary artists working today on whom he has had a profound and sustained influence. Dialogues in Color will be the first exhibition to specifically locate Delaney's creative presence in Greenwich Village. This show is an opportunity to flesh out Delaney's experience as a Black gay painter living in what was then often called New York's "Left Bank," a reference to the bohemian cultural center of Paris. While art historical narratives often tell the histories of the Harlem Renaissance as separate from that of the downtown art scenes and vice versa, Dialogues in Color will showcase the exchange between these movements and how they reflected the cultural, racial, and socio-economic environment of NYC both at the time and well into the present day.

If NYSS is selected as a Host Organization, the ArtTable fellow will have the opportunity to conduct original research that will be included in the exhibition catalogue. This research will focus on topics like the Greenwich Village at the height of a period of artistic experimentation; the diversity of artists in the downtown arts scene; the Whitney Studio Club's engagement with a wide range of artists; the early years of the Whitney Museum; and Delaney's relationships with his sitters, both known and anonymous. This research will bolster the show's secondary focus on Delaney's lasting impact on BIPOC artists who claim Delaney as an ancestor of their work. In addition to this research, the ArtTable fellow will aid Dr. Carmack in arranging public programming initiatives and developing strategic partners to promote the show. This experience will enable the fellow to develop the professional skills necessary to bring a project to fruition.

Required Skills/Qualifications: The fellow must be adept at conducting comprehensive research on early 20th-century art history, including experience working with archival materials and an ability to glean information from a wide range of different sources. An interest in or familiarity with the bohemian communities of Greenwich Village and Harlem and the historical and cultural context that surrounded Delaney is welcome. An appreciation for the interdisciplinary aspects of Delaney's work, such as his connections to the jazz movement, is preferred. Strong writing skills are necessary for creating exhibition catalogue entries and promotional materials. The fellow must be meticulous in documenting their research to ensure accuracy and effective communication while collaborating with the co-curators and NYSS staff. The fellow should also

exhibit good project management skills in order to coordinate their research and exhibition-related responsibilities.

Finally, a collaborative and collegial spirit is essential for working effectively with the co-curators and NYSS staff. The ability to work in tandem with a team is crucial to the success of the exhibition. Because of the School's modest scale, the fellow will have an opportunity to work across and collaborate with other departments, such as Facilities and Development. As such, the Fellow will be introduced to a broad view of working in the nonprofit arts sector, as well as the cooperation necessary to successfully plan and implement an exhibition.
